The Passing of two of our Life Members

It is with regret we record the passing of two of Canterbury Potters's life members, Rosie Thompson and Rosemary Perry.



Rosie Thompson who died on 30 October 2020, was, over her 40 or so years of membership, a tireless worker and support for CPA. Devoting her time freely, she was always one of the first to appear at any working bee.

Her award winning, beautifully realised ceramic birds which she exhibited both nationally and locally, enhanced the reputation of the club.

As a member of the New Zealand Society of Potters, she often hosted regional meetings at her house, insuring a good turnout with her generous hospitality.



Rosemary Perry who died on the 5 January 2021 at the age of 92 was one of Canterbury Potters foundation members giving her time unstintingly to the establishment of the club in Canterbury. She was the first person in New Zealand

to fire an electric kiln with enclosed elements, enabling it to be fired in a reduction atmosphere. She also made bronze castings of her some of her ceramic heads.

Rosemary represented Canterbury on more than one occasion on the New Zealand Potters executive. She was the author of the definitive book on material hazards, Potters Beware, continuing to be a reliable and countless source of information and help to the club right to the last.

They will both be greatly missed.

Nola Barron: potter, sculptor, gallery director New Book for Sale:

Brief outline:

This publication covers three different aspects of Nola Barron's life and work. After an initial interest in painting, she found pottery was the craft she wished to follow and enrolled at Yvonne Rust's Studio of Design in Christchurch. There she learned the basics of throwing, glazing and firing and, after about two years of tuition, she established her own studio and built a kiln. Not satisfied with wheel-thrown domestic objects she experimented with hand-built clay forms to produce modernist sculptural forms, often in response to land formations. She also produced ceramic tiles which were assembled and mounted on plywood. Wishing to expand her knowledge. Nola enrolled as a part-time student at the University of Canterbury School of Fine Arts where she studied design and sculpture. Extending her range of materials, she produced sculpture in fibreglass, cast aluminium and cast bronze. During her career as a potter and sculptor, Nola Barron achieved success and acceptance of both her peers and the public. She exhibited widely throughout

New Zealand, was a member of 'The Group' in Christchurch, and is represented in public collections. Her significant contribution to the pottery movement in this country is recognised in honorary life membership of both Canterbury Potters' Association and New Zealand Society of Potters. In 1977 Nola was appointed director of the Canterbury Society of Arts (CSA) Gallery, a position she held for ten years.


