Level 2 Guidelines for Members:

As New Zealand moved back into Level 2, please review the CPA and government policy during this time.

Students, members, contractors and tutors using our rooms must agree to, and follow this health and safety plan. The situation is always changing, and we will keep you updated by email as we respond to the Government announcements.

Access to the studio by members at any time:

We can only have a maximum of 10 people in the rooms at one time as this is less controlled than our classes. If you arrive and there are already 10 people, you will need to leave. We suggest you ask if anyone is planning to leave soon, so you can wait outside. Studio practice is the same as classes.

What to bring:

- A pen for signing in, writing invoices etc.
- Hand sanitiser. (We have some but cannot guarantee supply.)
- Cloth towels to clean your work area, and an extra one for your own hands. (There are no cloth towels in the studio). Take towels and cloths home with you.
- Bucket with lid to take clay slops home.
- Water bottle, flask or coffee from a café. (You can't access the kitchen to make a drink.)
- Consider wedging your clay at home if possible, as space may be limited.

Contact Tracing

It is a Government requirement that **you sign in every time you come to the rooms.** Sanitise your hands first, then fill out the sign in book inside the door and use the covid app poster, using your own pen.

Hygiene

- If you are sick, do not come to the rooms and call your GP or Health line. (If you come and appear sick, you may be asked to go home.)
- Before signing in, sanitize your hands and use your own pen.
- Wash your hands, wash your hands, wash your hands
- Bring your own hand sanitiser. There is liquid soap in the toilet area and near the main sink.
- Use the paper towels by the sink and in the toilet area.
- No food on the premises please.

Physical distancing

- 1 metre physical distancing.
- Be mindful of other people in the rooms, and your proximity to each other.

Tables and chairs are positioned to allow at least a metre distancing. Do not move tables or chairs.

Sit where there is an X on the table.

Clean up

- Before you start and at end, clean your work area (table and wheel) with water and handyandy (in cleaners cupboard), using the red bucket on the bench as you usually would.
- Wipe down with your towel.
- Use the disinfectant in the spray bottle (on the main bench) with a paper towel as a final sanitise.
- Do the same for any CPA tool or equipment (banding wheels, hairdryers, extruder handles, slabroller, bucket handles etc) that you use.

Other Important Information

- The kitchen, office and glaze room must not be accessed.
- Consider wedging your clay at home if possible, as space may be limited.

Kintsugi workshop - Yuka O'ShannessyExchange Christchurch (@_xchc) Saturday, 20th of March



Saturday, 1st May

Throwing and altering techniques (Demo only)

Tutor: Michael Michaels

9:30-12:30pm

Michael, our Monday night tutor, has been throwing for many years. At this workshop Michael will demonstrate and talk about throwing on the wheel then altering the form to create a new piece.

Sgraffito (Participation)

Tutor: Hugh Rickard 1:30 -4:30pm

Hugh is our Tuesday night tutor, with experience in raku and decorative techniques. At this workshop Hugh will be teaching how to decorate your pieces with the sgraffito technique of cutting away the clay.

Using Stains and wax resist to enhance decoration (Participation)

Margaret is our Tuesday morning tutor with considerable experience in many forms of surface treatment. At this workshop Margaret will use stains in over and under glazes and the application of a wax resist to enhance thrown and hand built pieces.

Canterbury landscapes, soils, and glazes (Demo and Discussion)

Andrew, our Saturday morning tutor, is very knowledgeable about the geology of our local area. At this workshop Andrew will show how to prepare and make glazes from easily collected local materials. Recipes for glazes included and the relationship to classical Asian glaze families, celadon, tenmoku and shino will be discussed.

Electric kiln policy

The Electric kiln policy has been updated and you can find this in our folder on the white plinth. We would like to remind members about access to our electric kilns and our updated commercial production policy.

Access to Kilns: Between classes and members' work, our kilns are heavily booked. Classes take precedence for firing, but kilns are usually available to members some weekends and term holidays. All firing programs start firing from 9 pm.

Commercial Production:

If you are producing for sale;

- You must **not** use the club glazes. You are welcome to use the facilities, but you **must provide** your own glaze materials.
- You must organise to fire your own work in a private firing (some weekends only or school holidays). If you are not authorised to fire a kiln you must organise a member who is authorised to fire your work for you. You (the person who is wanting to fire the work) must pay for kiln hire on the day you fire your ceramic pieces.

Commercial productions is defined as any work that is offered for sale: either via the internet (e.g. yours or a group website, Instagram, Facebook, etc), supplied to any shop or gallery, presented at markets or exhibitions (either by yourself or on your behalf) or created to fulfil a commission or contract. The CPA can also refer members to other places where commercial firing can be done for them.

Exemption1: Members who make the occasional pot for sale are excluded "occasional" is defined as no more than three items and not to exceed a combined 150mm cubed on average per month.

Exemption 2: Any work produced specifically for entry into CPA Annual exhibition is exempted.
