We had a fantastic workshop led by Tatyanna Meharry who was our guest selector and exhibitor and a successful exhibition at the Museum. We have installed one of our new kilns from Cobcraft which is working very well and our front loader should arrive by the end of December. Our old Cobcraft kiln will be advertised on Trade me. We will let you know when it will be advertised. Our Cone 6 glazes have been well received and are in full use. You may have noticed we have reduced our number of clay types to about six. The primary reason for the reduction in clays is to bring into line the provision of cone 6 clay types. We have many more suppliers of clay in Christchurch, which is great. These are General Pottery, a Bot Pots outlet and Allan Mauger who imports clay directly. There are plenty of options out there.

We also farewell three of our tutors - Andrew Carran, Melanie Davies and Mary Lou Foate - at the end of this term. All three have been very inspiring as well as encouraging to the students they have taught and are greatly respected for the knowledge and skill they bring to their classes. Thank you so much for your teaching!

We are currently considering the Covid 'traffic light' framework and what it means for our club. We will let you know as soon as we have resolved how we will manage the current orange 'traffic light' requirements.

We hope to see you at our Christmas Pottery Market this Sunday, please support this event and tell your friends and family.

**Christchurch Makers Market** features a small collection of locally-made foods and art set in a cosy architectural building







# Tessa's love of pottery born from ill health

Ten years ago Tessa Chisholm was working on the Hollywood film *The Hobbit*, until her health took a turn for the worst

She moved to her grand mother's bach at Waikuku Beach, where she was housebound for five years struck down by a series of illnesses and back surgery, until she discovered pottery.

Tessa was working in Wellington as a 3D-stereographer in post-production, but the long hours peering at a computer screen and film footage took a toll on her health.

Now thanks to her new love of pottery and Enterprise North Carıterbury's (ENC) business start-up course, Tessa has launched her own business Little Bach

"I took up pottery to keep me sane and make new friends and I had the dream to make a living off this craft," she says.

She joined the Canterbury Potters' Association six years ago and she was mentored by Rangiora woman Frederika Ernsten, who is now in her 80s.

I really wouldn't be where I am today without Frederika's tuition, and the support of the club," Tessa says. "She (Frederika) was passing her legacy on to us and it was just lovely.

She began selling her creations at the Arts Centre in Christchurch and at local markets, but had a dream of setting up her own businesses and offering potter; classes, but lacked the confidence to take the plunge.

That was until she heard about the business start-up course through Michelle Becks at the Ministry of Social Development in Rangiora.

Tessa received a business start-up grant and was accepted on to the course with ENC business development manager

"It's not just about the pottery, it's about connecting everything together and I wouldn't have been able to do it without the course.

"I've been wanting to go in this direction for a number of years and I've been buying equipment, but I didn't know anything about setting up a business, so the course gave me the confidence to go

There is an anxiousness about not having an income, but the course encourages you that the right thing to do is to spend the money to get it done properly, such as getting an accountant."

Tessa is offering classes to small groups of six, which means she is able to operate under Alert Level 2 restrictions by spacing out the work spaces in the little

She says anyone can learn pottery.

"I thought if I could teach the boyfriend, I could teach anyone and he made a really nice beer mug.

"Pottery is good for the soul, you get a lot of reward creating something from a lump of clay and with the students they get such a buzz when they create something.

The art of pottery can also be frustrating, as Tessa has heard stories about students throwing their unfinished pots at the wall.

Fortunately that hasn't happened at the Little Batch Pottery studio so far.

"They're not allowed to do that yet, because I want a clean studio.

"Until you fire your pot, you can break it down and do it again.

"Once you fire it, it's forever and we don't want archaeologists digging it one day and wondering what people were doing in Waikuku.




